Go Global Program Design

Go Global Program Design, Continued:

- Panned all logistics for the six-week program, including four weeks in rural Tanzania. Responsibilities included coordinating:
 - Guest speakers (including six speakers, five of whom were brought from Kenya; included an internationally-recognized human rights activist and award-winning authors)
 - Language training (pre-departure and in country)
 - o Experiential learning and field trips (including multi-day trips)
 - o Communications access for students (in challenging rural areas)
 - o Logistics such as student accommodation and in-country transport
 - O Student health and safety

Go Global Program Outcomes

- Go Global Tanzania: Community, Creativity, and Communications 2019 was a huge success; the program was to be offered in 2020 but was cancelled due to Covid, and hopes are to offer it again in 2022
- Beyond the two courses and experience itself, students went on to:
 - O Collaborate to produce a dual-campus, multidisciplinary, multi-media gallery exhibition, held in FINA Gallery September 2-6, 2019, showcasing their writing, photography, and creative projects, such as a collaborative film project and a computer game a student designed
 - O Publish writing and photography in the student newspaper *The Phoenix* as well as "In the Field" (University Relations) on the UBC website: https://ok.ubc.ca/in-the-field/creativity-in-tanzania/
 - O Publish writing in international online literary journals, such as poetry in Liberated Pen: Liberated Voices Journal
 - O Develop contacts and experience in the international publishing community, such as Arielle Shakour's involvement as copy editor and assistant for the African-based literary journal *Brave Voices* (67)
 - O Publish a chapbook (Arielle Shakour's Swala Three)

*The program inspired interest in writing beyond those who participated. For example, a student in my MGMT 240 class had her interest so sparked by the sounds of the program and its opportunities that she came to talk to me about her interest in creative writing. I put her in contact with the editor of an international online literary journal, and student Jayitha Vunnam had a short story published in *Brave Voices*.
