In this course, we will critically engage with a variety of modes of public memory, including museums, monuments and statues, historical sites, heritage narratives, and memorials. Recognizing that practices of commemoration are designed to be persuasive, functioning to produce community, place, and identity (e.g. nationhood), we will be attentive to what is remembered, how, by whom, and in whose interests. For instance, we will examine how war is commemorated in museums, through symbols (e.g. the red poppy), and rituals of remembrance. The course will also provide students an introduction to two key research methods of public memory: oral history research and archival research.
