## Course Description

This course is informed by a postcolonial/critical race approach, critically examining representations of suffering and injustice, primarily in the Global South. The course provides a critical perspective on universal human rights, specifically in terms of how human rights have paradoxically seemed to reinforce hierarchical distinctions among humans. A core theme of our analysis will be to seek to understand the way modes of human rights witnessing construct relationships. While we will discuss mainstream and popular modes of human rights witnessing (e.g. survivor narratives, documentary film, mainstream journalism, NGO donation appeals), the major literary and film texts and theoretical writings primarily provide critical analysis of and alternatives to these dominant modes of representation. The approach to the course emphasizes self-reflection and collaboration, and seeks to understand how the theories and concepts we study are relevant to our own lives. Note: Course texts include representations of violence and abuse.
