Course Description:

This course focuses on Canadian screen culture by focusing on the Okanagan as setting for screen narratives and site of production for American runaway production and reality TV. It necessarily considers American and Anglo-Canadian cultural imperialism and colonization. Nationalism and national identity, and regionalism have been central to Canadian culture generally, and they are crucial to understanding the context of film and television production and reception in this country and in this region. We will begin this course by viewing one of the earliest Canadian-made film and feminist classic Back to God's Country (1919) to explore how Canadian cinema and television originated and continues to flourish on the margins of popular entertainment in Canada leveraging tropes of a gendered cold wild north. Then we will survey 1. the conditions limiting films growth in Canada and the more recent history of production of runaway production in Canada, 2. Okanagan 1980 auteur driven locally shot and based narrative films, 3. Okanagan Film Commission and BC filmmaking and its histories and the Hallmark/Lifetime channel era of the 2000s, 4. Contemporary Okanagan settler whiteness and masculinities, 5. Indigenous Okanagan screen cultures, and 6. Streaming Video on Demand Okanagan cinema
